Music Notes

He is Risen! Blessed Easter season to all of you!

The Easter season lasts for 40 days (until Jesus' ascension). Lent is also a 40 day season (excluding Sundays). Eastern Orthodox and Celtic Christians observe a 40 day pre-Christmas Fast (Advent).

What is the significance of the number 40?

In the Old Testament, the story of Noah had rain for 40 days and 40 nights. The 12 tribes of Israel spent 40 years in the wilderness. Moses spent 40 days and 40 nights on Mt. Sinai. Jesus was tempted in the desert and fasted for 40 days. Saul, David, Solomon and Josiah each ruled for 40 years. Jesus spent time teaching his disciples for 40 days after his resurrection – until his ascension

The number 40 isn't the "big deal" here. It's meant to represent a complete period of time, or a large amount of time. So instead of getting into details of if these events were 32 days, or 46 years, 40 was used as a number that people would understand to be a significant amount of time.

So during our Easter Season, which is a complete period of time – it will last until May 19, let us rejoice that Jesus has conquered the grave for our sins, and is forever Lord of All! Alleluia!


This Joyful Eastertide (ELW#391)

Torch Committee

Did you know that there is a small group of St. Peter's members who send care packages to a number of TORCH college students 3 times a year? Our church is among several other congregations in Northfield who support first-generation college students and Northfield's growing low-income population.

The Northfield TORCH program is a collaboration among members of the school district and community partners to address the issues of the achievement gap. Originally TORCH served Latino students, but because of its success, their programs are now available to all traditionally under-served students, including first-generation college students and low-income youth. The mission of TORCH is to improve the graduation and post-secondary participation rates of Northfield's students of color, low-income students, and youth who would be first-generation college attendees. Although TORCH only expected to serve about 100 youth at the time when it first started in 2005, the program now serves over 450 current students and 100 alumni.

In the fall, winter and spring, our group coordinates sending care packages filled with cash, small gifts and food items. If you are looking for an easy way to make a difference in a young person's life, consider joining our group. This volunteer project is easy, rewarding and impactful. You simply drop off donated items at a determined location by a specific date. It's that easy!

You Asked - 'If I want to donate money to St. Peter's in memory of someone, how should I do that?'

- Make the check payable to St. Peter's Lutheran Church
- Write in the amount you wish to donate
- In the memo line, write "In Memory of (the person's name)" and either Undesignated or Mission Endowment
- If you write "Undesignated" St. Peter's will use the funds toward the most current need (i.e., Upstairs Bathrooms, Narthex Renovation, etc.)
- If you write "Mission Endowment" the money goes into our endowment fund for the church. This money is not considered part of the current budget but is a separate account. It is used at the discretion of the Mission Endowment Committee for advancing the mission of the church.
- If you don't write in either Undesignated or Mission Endowment, the money is put into undesignated funds.

On April 28, 2024, Tharan Leopold and Terrence Hassanally will be making a presentation during coffee hour on St. Peter's Gift Policy and the process of gifting the church in your will or the process of giving gifts of money or stock during your lifetime.

Council Notes

To express God's love and grace in building a community where people **believe** in God, **belong** to Christ, and **become** disciples who serve in day-to-day living.

Devotion: Pastor led a brief discussion on a LeaderWise blog titled "When People Are Commodities." Blogger Cindy Halvorson wondered "what would it look like to shift our attention from concern about the lifespan of our institutions to caring enough about others to meet them where they are?" Pastor said that while it's worthy to be concerned for the life of an institution, if it disappears, a lot more than just the institution vanishes. "We all have concern for the life of the institution. It's a challenge," he said, "(but) It's important to take an interest in people for who they are and the gifts they bring."

Pastor's Report: Preparing two sermons a week during Lent and preparing confirmation lessons dominates his time. Pastor and Kleppe met with middle and high school students and their parents for a conversation about their hopes for a youth director. Sunday School is functioning, but not sustainable, with parents taking charge in the interim. Barb Streed, Assistant to the Bishop, will facilitate our retreat. The middle/high school summer trip will be a July 7-12 canoe outing at Camp Amnicon in Wisconsin with youth from St. John's Lutheran and First United Church of Christ. Architect Patrick Bougie has provided Schmidt Homes with detailed drawings for remodeling the second-floor restrooms. The goal is to replicate the modernization of the first-floor restrooms off the narthex completed in 2019.

Council President: Council President: Kleppe has been talking with and listening to dozens of people about their hopes for the congregation since her election in February.

Treasurer: Giving through February was about \$13,500 under budget, but expenses were less than budgeted, yielding a \$331 surplus for the first two months of the year.

Synod Offices Update: An open house is pending.

Old Business: Motion by Bleckwehl and second by Olson for volunteers from the congregation to work with a small group from Bethel Lutheran on landscaping at Sarah's House, the former St. Peter's parsonage. The work is expected to be done in April.

Volunteers will be sought to assist Olson in crafting baptism boxes given to the parents of baptized children. The boxes contain a blanket provided by the congregation. Olson said each one requires about three hours of work. He builds about six a year.

A new subcommittee was created to bring ideas to the council in May for branding and a consistent church logo and signage for exterior doors, exterior and interior signs, website, newsletter, printed materials, and other uses. Members are Bleckwehl, Hendee, Kopack, Olson, and Weeks.
